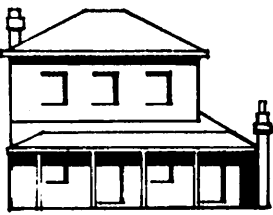

HERITAGE WEEKEND

On Saturday/Sunday, 28/29 March the Watch House was open from 10.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. each day. The event was well publicised by posters and leaflets but we did not anticipate such an exciting response - almost 200 visitors! Members who helped at the Watch House were kept busy all the time.

The Police Historical Society provided an interesting display of old weapons, shackles used on convicts, badges, charge books and a "cat o' nine tails".

These alone would draw a crowd but we also had a 20 minute slide/tape set, "The Balmain Waterfront" as well as our display of photographs. The Association's publications were displayed for sale.

The slide set was well received and many people sat through a second showing (for pleasure) and remained out in the courtyard drinking tea and enjoying the day. GERANIUMS

The plant we commonly call geranium is not the true geranium which is a small plant seldom seen here. However by usage we continue to call "geranium", plants originating in South Africa that correctly belong to pelargonium species.

TYPES: There are many varieties - the commonest being the Zonal or Hortorum, the Regal Pelargonium (with flowers resembling azaleas but more dramatic) and the "Ivy" geranium (Peltatum).

Other kinds include the scented leaf types which have usually insignificant flowers but the leaves have different scents such as lemon, peppermint, nutmeg, coconut, apple, lime etc. One variety of geranium with rose-scented leaves is grown largely in France and North Africa to provide an essential oil to blend with the much more expensive attar of roses in the perfume industry.

All the scented leaf types can be used in cooking, potpourri and sachets. Years ago the lemon scented variety was used extensively for lining cake tins.

The modern geranium is compact and free-flowering from Spring to autumn - try to get named varieties.

SITUATION: Prefer full sun and light sandy soil with very good drainage because they do not tolerate wet feet. In fact they can collapse quite suddenly due to excessive moisture.

FERTILISING: They are light feeders which is why they often thrive at base of trees and shrubs. Give small quantities of mixed general fertiliser every 2 to 3 months commencing after pruning in Autumn. Always water well after giving fertiliser. When flower buds form liquid fertiliser such as Aquasol or Thrive or Fish Emulsion can be used. Over-feeding gives excessive bush foliage susceptible to disease.

PRUNING: Essential to prune all geraniums or they become lanky with only scanty flowers at the tops. In March or April cut back to 2 or 3 nodes from base of each stem and thin out very old stems. Geraniums are only at their best for about 2 years so always have some cuttings coming on for replacements.

PROPAGATION: Is usually by taking cuttings from the tips of the plants (about 4 to 5 inches). Remove the bottom leaves and any flower buds and cut cleanly just below a node. They are best put in a pot first (3 to 5 inch pot). Make holes with a pencil for each cutting. Dip in Rooting Powder if you have it and put in pot making the soil firm around each cutting. Water well and keep in sheltered position. When they start to sprout pinch out growing tips to make plants bushy. Gradually harden the plants to sunlight. Should have roots in about 6 weeks and the ready for the garden.

DISEASES: Main fungus disease is Rust seen as orange-brown spots commencing underneath the leaves. Pick off affected leaves and destroy. Spray with Zineb or Captan directing all spray particularly under the leaves. Sometimes the plants become infested with small green caterpillars which are the offspring of a night-flying moth. Treat all insects with an insecticide.

POT PLANTS, WINDOW BOXES AND BASKETS: Geraniums are ideal for all of these. Turn pot plants every few days to get equal sun on all sides. For baskets, the "Ivy" geranium is the best though it is even better grown on netting or a sunny fence or just as a garden plant for ground cover. Any plants in pots or baskets require close supervision for watering.

POTTING MIXTURES, (especially for geraniums): Spread newspaper on ground or table and mix together 5 litres good garden soil, 2½ litres coarse sand (NOT beach sand) ½ cup blood and bone, 1/3 cup dolomite, 1/3 cup crushed charcoal and a light sprinkling of superphosphate.

Another mixture (without soil) - mix together ½ bucket coarse sand, ½ bucket well-moistened peat moss, ½ bucket old powdered cow manure, 5 table-spoons mixed fertiliser, 4 tablespoons dolomite and one handful blood and bone.
