BROMELIADS

Do you have a paved courtyard, rather shady, perhaps inclined to be damp? You have wondered what to grow in pots.

There are possibly dozens of courtyards similar to this in Balmain.

Bromeliads may be the answer.

A recent speaker at the Balmain Garden Club told us that he had just these conditions and had become tired of fighting the environment by trying to grow unsuitables and had taken up Bromeliads and had found them easy and interesting.

In fact he was so taken with them, he now takes trips to America to hunt down new ones. Unfortunately, when they arrive in Sydney they have to go through fumigation and they do not always survive the gas chamber.

Bromeliads are not well known to most people here. Queenslanders appreciate them more - Pineapples, of course, being a Bromeliad.

NECESSARY CONDITIONS: A loose well-draining potting mix, a very little fertilising (osmocote or nutricote slow-release types). Can grow outdoors or indoors, in a good light. Keep receptacle in centre of plant filled with water. Some can be tied on to trees but it is not recommended here as they may not get enough water. It is different in the tropics where it rains very frequently.

Re-pot each year. They like some filtered sunlight, or shade in summer. They originated in Central and South America, growing from sea-level to 14 000 feet.

They do not care for frost but that is very seldom a problem here. If it did threaten, cover the plants for the night with newspaper.

PROPAGATION: Mainly by offsets or "pups", as they are called. After the offsets have developed, ease out the centre plant which has had a flower because it will not flower again.

It is said to get a rapid increase of offsets, try dissolving a birth control pill in a quart of water and soak the plants. This technique also works with ferns.

VARIETIES: Many in this genera of 2 000 species. Some commonly seen types are Bilbergia Mutans with reedy foliage and pink and blue flower bracts.

Vriesia Carinata with fan shaped bracts of scarlet and yellow; and Aechmea Fasciata which has beautifully striped foliage and large pink flower bracts.

Many flower for months and they can be taken indoors for decoration.

WHERE TO OBTAIN: Bromeliads are very slow growing and therefore expensive in the first instance. Are usually found among the House Plants in the Nurseries and I have seen them in Coles in the City.

A couple of nurseries at Dee Why always stock them (Dos Pueblos Nursery and the Willandra Orchid Co).

As with all branches of horticulture, if one becomes interested in a particular field and needs to know more, the place to find out is the specialty plant society.

In this case it is the Bromeliad Society which meets at the School of Horticulture at Ryde on the second Saturday of each month at 2 00 pm.

Of course, they have a trading table at these meetings and there is always a display of interesting varieties.

FAMILY HISTORY

Dr P D Lark of Longueville has been gracious enough to provide us with the death notice of one of his forbears - Frederick Lemm whose name lives on in Lemm Street, Balmain. Frederick Lemm has been accredited with the building of the Customs House at Circular Quay. The Customs House was built in three stages, 1844, 1887 and 1899 but it is not known when Lemm worked on the project.

The notice appeared in the Sydney Morning Herald of 31 March 1904 and read:

LEMM - 29 March 1903, at his residence, Bremer House, Snails Bay, Balmain, Frederick Lemm, senior - aged 77 years.

An old and highly esteemed resident of Balmain, Mr Frederick Lemm, died at his residence, Bremer House, Snails Bay, on Sunday at the age of 77 years. The deceased was well-known in bowling circles and was a member of the City and Gladstone Park Bowling Clubs at the time of his death. He occupied the position of vice-president of the latter club, the members of which attended his funeral, which took place at the Waverly Cemetery on Tuesday afternoon, and was well attended.

Bremer House still stands on the corner of Lemm Street and Ballast Point Road and was Lemm's home from 1876 onwards. His workshop with his name inscribed on the wall is nearby.

Mrs J Cummings of Carlingford writes regarding the Cummings family of Booth Street, Balmain.

William Cummings married Emily Theresa Brennan in St Andrew's Congregational Church on 1 January 1901, the day of the Federation of the Australian colonies.

Mrs Cummings is also descended from Acmon Hutcheson, a carpenter by trade. Hutcheson Street, Rozelle is named after him.

Does anyone have any information on these families?
