Garden Tasks in Spring

When one surveys a spring garden, with all its bulbs, perennials and annuals blazing, one is inclined to feel a rest from garden activities has been earned. But in fact, when Spring has come, summer is close on its heels, and if a rotating garden of beauty is desired, there is not much let-up

Annuals: keep all dead flowers picked off to prolong flowering and liquid fertiliser like Aquasol or Zest to keep things going. Some types such as ranunculi and others only have one real flowering, so it is no use keeping them, but pull them out and plant a summer annual in their place.

Seeds: for summer, can be put in all vacant places, verbenas, nemesia, snapdragons, marigolds, californian poppies, petunias, these are just a few than can be used.

Bulbs: do not cut foliage off too early, must yellow completely. It is sometimes possible to plait the fading leaves and put under the foliage of neighbouring plants. Summer and autumn bulbs such as lilliums, vallottas, sprekelias, irises, callas etc., are now available to be planted at this time. No animal manures.

Cuttings: best time for propagating before it gets too hot. Put in pots first and keep in shady spot and transplant later.

Carnations: good time for planting out. Like sandy soil, some lime and very little fertiliser. Full sun.

Citrus: can still be planted out. Mandarins do best hereabouts. Give older bushes sulphate of ammonia. Look over for swellings of gall-wasp and cut out same and burn. There is no chemical treatment effective for these.

Wattles: prune after flowering. Look for borers, with their deposits of webby sawdust outside tiny holes. Poke wire into hole to destroy grub. Squirt in meth. spirits or insecticide and seal hole with soap. Same treatment for tea-trees or other natives.

Camelias and azaleas: prune lightly after flowering and remove any dead wood. Fertilise lightly with camelia fertiliser. No lime. Remove flower bases on camellias.

Fuchsias: nip back new growth several times to make plants bushy. Fertilise. Water well.

Roses: too late for bare root planting but can be bought in pots and planted out at all times. Do not feed new roses until lightly in October. Older bushes can be fed lightly each month. Spray every 3 weeks with a complete spray containing fungicide and insecticide, such as "Rose-Glo", "Complete Spray" etc. Add a little "Chem-Spred" or soapy water to make spray stick on, and also a little "Aquasol" or "Thrive" is a help if added to other spray at the same time.

Shrubs: prune after flowering and fertilise.

Bougainvilleas: prune back 1/3rd, and feed.

Gardenias: Use blood and bone, or camellia fertilizer. No lime. If looking yellow, sprinkle Epsom Salts around. If no improvement, use chelated iron.

Indoor plants: re-pot and give liquid fertiliser every 2-3 weeks, or use Osmocote slow-release fertiliser.

Hydrangeas: good plants for shady areas. If wanting to change pink ones to blue, use Blueing Compound (aluminium) every 2 weeks for 3 months. For blue to pink flowers, this is not so easy, can try some lime around base.

Dahlias: planting out time. Small varieties such as Pompons, Collarettes or Nymphae look best in small gardens. Good hardy plants.

Orchids: as flowering spikes finish, cut off close to base and move pots to position of half sun daily.

Chrysanthemums: nip out centres repeatedly to get large numbers of flowers. Fertilise monthly.

Outdoor Pots: Re-pot if necessary and fertilise. Keep pots off ground on half-bricks or something else to keep out ants, earthworms, slaters etc., as these are root disturbers.

Poinsettias: as flowering finishes, prune right back to about 2-3 nodes on each limb. For cuttings, use pieces about 12 ins. Let dry for a few hours before using.
