Patricia Quinn has studied at the Julian Ashton Art School and the Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts, Singapore. Has exhibited in Singapore, Sydney and Canberra and her work is held in collections in Philadelphia, England, France, Japan, Hawaii and Australia. Patricia works with the Mo-Ku style using rice paper, vegetable root and mineral colours in accordance with thousands of years of Chinese culture.

Bronwen van Leeuwen is a graduate of the Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts, Singapore, and the City Art Institute, Sydney. Has exhibited and taught extensively in Singapore and Australia, and held several Chinese Brush Painting workshops using the mediums of rice paper, silk, porcelain and ceramics. HISTORICAL QUESTION AND ANSWER

Can you help?

1. Mr. Mori Flapan is researching the history of the steam pilot service of Port Jackson which was one of the earliest to use steamers in the world. In fact in 1877 the Marine Board placed into service the world's first purpose-built pilot steamer, the CAPTAIN COOK.

Balmain has a strong connection with the steam pilot service in that all four of the steam pilot vessels were built by Hort's Dock at Balmain. These vessels were:

Name	Date of Launch
THETIS	1868
CAPTAIN COOK (1)	Nov 1876
CAPTAIN COOK (11)	3 Dec 1892
CAPTAIN COOK (111)	10 Dec 1938

Further information on all these vessels particularly contemporary references to the launch of the THETIS and CAPTAIN COOK (1) and photographs of CAPTAIN COOK (1)

Archives or other reference material are sought especially the whereabouts of any local Balmain newspapers of that period; the State Library only possesses copies of the Balmain Observer for the periods 1884-1889 and 1899-1907.

2. Mr. R.J. Rowell of Epping is seeking further information about his grandfather Frederick Rowell who, after his arrival in Adelaide in 1854, came to Sydney with his family and took over the licence of Dick's Hotel in Balmain around 1899.

3. Further information is sought by Frances Heathfield about the cricketer Ted Iredale, once a pupil of Birchgrove Primary School.

GRAVE COMMENT

Some time ago, a chance remark from an inner city real estate agent set up a chain of enquiries. He said that during the Depression the poor were allowed backyard burials.

We have been asking for confirmation of this, and the following snippets of information have come from a grave digger and from Professor Waterson of Macquarie University.

According to the grave digger, "six feet deep" was a legal minimum in early Health Acts. According to Professor Waterson the registration of burials was made by undertakers. In other words, no undertaker, no registration.

The reason for the regulation on depth is to prevent disease, and the Balmain Cemetery was closed when it "leaked".

The following may be of interest: In 1825, burials were regulated, and could not take place inside a church or a chapel (with special exceptions) nor in a town without a cemetery.

The plague of 1901 did NOT call for special regulations but in 1921 when cremation became an alternative, a new Act prescribed that the dead could be buried at the back of public houses. Still-born infants were often buried in backyards, and there was little exercise of control in the outback.

We would be grateful for more information.

VISIT FROM DEP STAFF
